Curby Has Some Reminders About Your Sanitation Service

Container Inspectors are Important to the Program

Yes, there really are people hired to come around and look inside your recycling containers to see if you are doing it right or if you are "contaminating" your recyclables. Inspectors are required to look into a set amount of the containers per year. Each day the inspectors will inspect 1000 containers in any given zone.



So far, they have found 2,013 violations and left educational materials on the door of the offending households. Continued violations could result in container removal and a higher monthly sanitation fee.

The biggest "contaminators" of recycling are: plastic bags of any kind, pizza boxes, paper plates, napkins, Styrofoam drink cups or plates or packing materials, party stuff and aluminum foil.

Another big problem inspectors keep finding is that your containers are set too close together at the curb and the sanitation truck's automatic pickup arms can't get between them to pick them up. Set your containers at least three feet apart at the curb.

No More Sanitation Furlough for Winter Visitors

The City no longer has a sanitation furlough program for winter visitors. In the past our part-time residents could discontinue their sanitation services during the months they were back in their home state. With the new Sanitation Ordinance, sanitation services will continue to bill for trash collection as long as a property is connected to a water source. Residents who suspend their sanitation service and reactivate it at the same address within a 12-month period, will be billed a \$125 fee.

Bulk Trash Collection

Goodyear is one of only two Valley cities that provide bulk trash pickup every week. To keep this a cost effective service it is important that residents cooperate and follow the rules. A grapple tractor (shown below) is used to collect bulk trash. Bulk trash must be in neat stacks on your property no farther than four feet from the curb and placed parallel to the curbline on collection day. Please try to help us serve you better on bulk collection days by following these rules.

Any non-City issued containers placed out on bulk collection day will no longer be emptied. Customers wishing to retain old (non-City issued) containers, must not place containers at curb on bulk collection day.

They will be considered "bulk" if found at curb and will be collected as bulk trash.

Bulk is considered items that cannot be placed inside a container due to size or content. Some items considered bulk are: tree limbs, palm fronds, branches, hedge clippings (please keep these items four feet in length), and light metal pipes less than one inch in diameter.

Appliances and furniture are also acceptable.

Grass clippings and any items shorter than 12" long should be bagged and placed in your garbage (beige) container.

Unacceptable items include: rocks, stones, gravel, dirt, tires, sod, oil and construction debris (drywall, paint, lumber, shingles, tile, and concrete).



Sanitation Service Tips

• The City has from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. to pick up your trash and recyclables on your designated pickup day. Route collection times may vary from week to week so be sure to set out your trash before 6 a.m. on your assigned day so you are not missed.

DON'T ASSUME A CERTAIN COLLECTION TIME!

- There are two different trucks for trash and recycling. They may pick up your trash and recyclables hours apart. Check inside your containers before removing them from the curb.
- For both trash and recyclables, it is not uncommon for a truck to pick up on one side of the street and not come down the other side for several hours. So if you see your neighbor's garbage has been picked up and not yours, please do not call unless it doesn't get picked up by 8 p.m.
- Containers must be placed with wheels to the curb three feet apart.

BEIGE CONTAINER IS FOR TRASH – Must use plastic bags to contain trash.

GREEN CONTAINER IS FOR RECYCLING – NO plastic bags allowed.

Public Safety Advisory Committee Brings 16 Service Recommendations

- 17 dedicated members
- 15 months of meetings
- 17 meetings
- 2 weekend field trips
- Numerous police and fire ride-alongs
- 2000 hours of study and research
- 16 recommendations

But numbers alone cannot possibly illustrate the phenomenal effort the members of the Goodyear Public Safety Citizen Advisory Committee exerted for



the rest of the city as they grappled with all the background information provided by the Police, Fire and Finance departments and as they listened to presentations by police and fire chiefs from other Valley cities. The following 16 sound recommendations they came up with best demonstrate the depth and innovative nature of their thinking.

Public Safety Citizen Advisory Committee Recommendations

Keeping Up with Growth

- 1. Include capital, operating, and maintenance costs for Police in all future development agreements.
- 2. Tie development agreements to the percent of completion, rather than timeframe.

Results and Accountability

- 3. Establish measurable performance outcomes for Police and Fire.
- 4. Publicize and maintain existing information network to implement evidence-based policy decisions.

Staff Retention

- 5. Establish significant bonus system and/or increase longevity pay percentages.
- 6. Implement various morale-booster events throughout year.

Funding

7. The committee is not recommending an increase in sales tax. The committee supports considering a public safety sales tax ONLY if: a) revenues are used for Police and Fire only, b) public safety funds currently in the budget are not supplanted, and c) current public safety percentage of the City's overall budget is not reduced.

Police

- 8. Adequate facilities for the Police is a top priority.
- 9. Maintain the current response times for Priority I and Priority 2 calls as the city grows.
- 10. Increase patrol officer available time to 15% in 2007 and to 30% by 2009.
- 11. Support and fund Police's approach to buy into or join an existing radio system.



Fire

- 12. Find ways to reduce the number of planned fire stations without compromising service levels.
- 13. Require sprinklers in new residential construction.
- 14. Create separate two-man EMS crews strategically placed in areas with high EMS volume and in new areas.
- 15. Initiate public awareness/prevention citizen group to help build awareness of sprinkler need.

Accountability

16. City will give status report every six months on implementation of recommendations.

From the Mayor

Innovative Citizens Work on Public Safety Needs

Again, a committee of Goodyear citizens demonstrated unequivocally the high caliber that identifies our residents. The thoroughness, professionalism, and dedication of the Public Safety Citizen Advisory Committee was clearly evidenced as its spokespersons Marvin Feir and Kathryn Wallinger presented the Committee's comprehensive final recommendations to the City Council on February 26.

They did a great job for us and for their neighbors - the

residents of Goodyear.

Fifteen months ago we entrusted a committee of 21 persons to come up with suggestions of how we could best serve their public safety needs - both police and fire/EMS. We asked them to

levels they expected from these departments, keeping

n ng aints facing Goodyer aund up. Since cts cor tell us what service in mind the budget constraints facing Goodyear as it tries

to build a city from the ground up. Since there are so many different services and projects competing for the City's revenues, we asked them to think creatively to come up with efficient alternative public safety service delivery methods. The ideas of the Committee would, in turn, complement strategies developed by City staff on public safety issues.

These citizens certainly achieved their mission. They came up with 16 sound recommendations that the City Council will study and consider (see story on facing page). Some of their recommendations confirm recent Council decisions.

One of the Committee's foremost suggestions is to build a Public Safety Administration Building "sooner rather than later," primarily for the overcrowded Police Department. We recently moved the Public Safety building up into our 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and, in the meantime, have leased space that Police and Fire administrations are moving into next

month as an interim solution to their overcrowding.

A problem with radio interoperability between cities was also high on the Committee's list of suggestions and we have put money into the 5-Year CIP to change radio systems so that our Police Department can communicate with neighboring police departments as well.

The Committee also took a thorough look at our traditional methods of fire/life safety delivery. Besides endorsing fire sprinklers in new residential construction to maintain low fire losses, they made suggestions about alternative two-man EMS teams operating out of smaller vehicles to help meet the Committee's desired four-minute medical response time. The Council will certainly consider these innovative approaches to service.

I'm extremely proud of the I7 members of this Committee who stayed with the process to the end. They did yeoman's work and, in turn, deserve the reporting accountability they have asked of us as we proceed on their suggestions. I commend them, not only on their work, but also for seeking accountability for their efforts. It is the least they deserve for the many hours of dedicated service they have given this city and all of its citizens. On behalf of the City, I extend my sincere gratitude for their invaluable service.

At Long Last the Design for Estrella Falls Regional Shopping Center

Westcor unveiled an outdoor lifestyle center design and architectural concept for the Estrella Falls Regional Shopping Center in late February. The stores will be grouped into small blocks by shopping type such as home furnishings, fashion and children's so that people can drive and park right at their destination without walking through the entire center. Shade structures as well as an abundance of mature landscaping (10 percent more than is required by City Code) will be used throughout to protect shoppers from the heat. Several restaurants, in addition to typical food court establishments, will offer patio dining amidst lush gardens. Valet parking will also be offered at the center.

This type of outdoor design concept and layout is the latest in shopping centers across the country and is proving to be very popular with the retailers, according to Garrett Newland, Assistant Vice President of Westcor. By each retailer having their own building, it allows them to better maintain their own unique identity in the shopping center and adds more interesting architectural treatments throughout.





Estrella Falls Regional Shopping Center site plan covers 105 acres east of 151st Ave. The 1.2 million-square-foot Estrella Falls mall is anticipated to open in March 2009.



Understanding the public's concern about shopping in the heat, key elements of the design of Estrella Falls include shade structures, misting systems and other water features throughout. Storefronts will have shaded overhangs for pedestrians and most of the pedestrian walkways will have unique shade canopies. Some of the main roadway through the center which also has on-street parking will have shade structures.

At the north end of the regional shopping center where the two anchor department stores and the theaters are located (Dillards and Harkins Theaters have already announced), Westcor is planning a grand plaza with lots of greenery, water features and public art that will serve as a gathering spot and a place for special events. A glass-enclosed food court is also planned that will seem to bring the outdoors in.

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Want to Learn About Police Work?

Ever wondered about the criminal justice system or why the police do what they do? What is it like to work as a dispatcher? Do police officers really have a quota on the number of tickets to write?

You have an opportunity to get these and other questions answered at the next Goodyear Police Citizens Academy which begins April 3 and ends June 12, 2007. This academy is free and the class meets each Tuesday night during this II-week period from 6 to 9 p.m. with free dinner provided each night.

This will be the fourteenth academy that Goodyear PD has conducted. Among the past graduates have been business owners, housewives, council members, and retirees. Some graduates of the academy have gone on to become Goodyear Police Volunteers, serve on review boards, and become more active in the community after taking the class.

Applicants need to be at least 18 years of age and do not have to be City of Goodyear residents.

New Electronic Water Meter Reading

If you live south of I-10 and are a City of Goodyear water customer, soon you will no longer be seeing a "meter reader" in your neighborhood. The City is going to the "radio read" electronic method of meter reading rather than the current handheld wand touch method. This radio read method is much more cost effective because one employee can drive a city vehicle down city streets and electronically collect

up to 33 reads a second within an eighth of a mile and simultaneously deposit them into a database.

Currently, it takes four people four days each month (128 hours) to read over 11,000 water meters in the City. With the new radio read method, one person with a special computer and a vehicle can read the entire city's meters in one day each month (8 hours), resulting in a 1600 percent more efficient use of water employees' time. These manpower savings will multiply many times over as the City's population keeps growing at its current rapid rate.

The City of Goodyear Water Resources Department has contracted with Metering Services, Inc. (MSI) of Tempe to change out a small reading device located on the lid of every meter box south of I-10 to make the meters electronically readable. MSI trucks will be in neighborhoods over the next four months changing out this device. Each driver will carry identification and a letter from the City authorizing him/her to be handling your meter reading device.

Except for normal monthly usage variations, you should see no difference in your water bill as a result of this new meter reading system. We are merely changing the method with which we read the usage at your meter – not how the meter computes your water usage.

President's Summit **Brings Together** Three University Presidents in Goodyear

"It's all about those who aren't here yet – 90 percent of our population," began Mayor Jim Cavanaugh as he welcomed the presidents and representatives from Franklin Pierce, University of St. Francis, and University of the Incarnate Word as well as five major Goodyear developers to the Goodyear President's Summit on Feb. 29th at the Wigwam Resort.

Mayor Cavanaugh told the attendees that Arizona and Goodyear, in particular, are unique in how fast they are growing. "We are asked how we will manage growth, when cities in other parts of the country are being asked how they will achieve growth. Where we are headed is in our hands. We have to decide the type of product we want – one of value and quality."

The purpose of the precedent-setting, two-day President's Summit was to bring together college presidents planning to locate their institutions in Goodyear so they could give quality input on the process and to give them the opportunity to talk among themselves and with Goodyear landowners with whom they might partner on campus development.

Prominent Arizona economist Elliott Pollack gave insight into Arizona and Goodyear's future telling the audience from Illinois, Texas and New Hampshire that one out of every 21 jobs created in the U.S. last year was in Phoenix. He said that in 2006 Arizona was #1 in population and #2 in job growth nationwide and that the trend should continue for years to come. Pollack predicted that the West Valley would make up 43% of the metro area's population by 2020 and that Goodyear, with its high-end workforce and 4,000-acre employment corridor, would add 100,000 people per decade plus be a leader in job growth.

Updates to the group included Goodyear's future plans for a library, high-density housing that would suit students, the City Center, and the new Ballpark Village.

City of Goodyear Water Resources Department New Home!

It may look like a Tuscan Villa, but it is really the headquarters for Goodyear's Water Resources Department off I57th Ave. south of MC 85 and is slated to be completed by October 2007.

The City's newest department was formed in 2004 and its staff members have been housed in makeshift trailers. The department has already grown by 50% from 35 to 51 employees since its formation.

"We will finally have a home," remarked Water Resources Director Shawn Bradford at the recent groundbreaking for the new facility which will house both administration and operations. "We're busting at the seams, so this building has been sorely needed. By having all the staff in the same building, we will be much more efficient and effective."

Tuscan styling was chosen for the building so it would blend in with the style of the housing being built in the area. The 13,000-square-foot

facility will house the administration upstairs and leave a portion of the interior unfinished for expansion so the building can keep up with future growth needs. Training space has been included that can be used by all City departments.

At the groundbreaking, Bradford thanked the Mayor and Council for their support

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
