

Tan garbage containers, green recycling containers, and bulk trash may be placed out no sooner than 6 p.m. the night before your designated collection day and must be placed out no later than 6 a.m. on your collection day. Contained Garbage & Recycle Collection Day Zones



Place containers on the street, with wheels against the curb. Bag and tie all garbage. Do not place plastic bags in the green (recycling) container.

What to Recycle

Paper: office paper, envelopes, junk mail, newspaper, magazines, telephone books, paper bags.

Glass bottles and jars (rinse lightly).

Plastics #I - #7 (please check for the chasing arrows recycling symbol; rinse lightly to clean these items): bottles, bottle caps, packaging, cups, food containers.


Aluminum/steel/tin cans (rinse lightly).

Cardboard/chipboard: office supply boxes, cereal boxes (clean, empty and broken down).

Carton: milk, juice, creamer (rinse lightly).

What NOT to Recycle

Bulk Trash

Bulk trash are items that are too bulky to fit in the trash container such as tree limbs, furniture, and appliances. DO NOT place bulk trash on driveways. sidewalks, electrical boxes, cable boxes, mail boxes, light poles, water meters, landscape, or where it may be a hazard to pedestrians or vehicles.

- Place bulk trash in the street, next to the curb.
- Brush should be cut to 4' lengths.
- Grass clippings must be double-bagged.
- Cacti must be placed in sealed boxes.
- It is the resident's responsibility to clean up small debris that may remain after collection.

Not Allowed for Bulk Collection

Household waste, hazardous materials, large auto parts, boats, tires, oil, rocks, dirt, construction materials such as roofing, drywall and concrete.

Business Registration

It's time to register your business with the City of Goodyear and pay the \$75 annual permit fee. Until recently, Goodyear was the only West Valley city that did not charge a fee for doing business. The new \$75 fee is in the mid-range compared to those charged by our neighboring cities.

The program helps the sales tax auditor make sure businesses are collecting and paying the proper taxes. The information also helps Fire and Police reduce their response times

to emergency calls. The City can reach registered businesses and share news about special programs such as the Small Business Breakfast Series, featuring experts who offer tips to grow one's business and improve visibility. Businesses are also kept abreast of sponsorship opportunities and campaigns, including Shop Goodyear and other annual events. Another program, Protect Your Business, is designed to alert local businesses immediately should

Registration also provides the City with information useful in promoting tourism, economic development opportunities, and the recruitment of new businesses and jobs. Many businesses, including dining and entertainment, are featured prominently on the City's website, along with locator maps and other useful information.

The \$75 annual permit fee was due Dec. 31, but a grace period is in effect until Jan. 31. Failure to register and pay the fee can result in fines of up to \$500. A business permit is required for any person or company doing business in the City of Goodyear, including home-based businesses. Nonprofit organizations, churches, schools, and vendors who sell only at Goodyear Marketplace are exempt. Sole proprietors and individuals must include proof of citizenship, such as driver's permit, passport, visa, etc. along with the application.

In January, Behavior Research, a professional market research company, will be conducting 400 random telephone surveys for us with Goodyear residents. Christmas Tree Disposal

The holidays are over, and it's time to get rid of that dried out Christmas tree. Goodyear residents have two choices: drop it off for recycling or leave it out for bulk trash pickup.

Don't be a Grinch - Recycling is a Cinch!

Eco-friendly residents can get a "green" start on the New Year by dropping trees at one of five convenient locations. Instead of bulking up the landfill, give old trees new life as recycled wood chips to landscape parks and playgrounds. Only bare trees can be recycled, so remove all lights, ornaments and tinsel. The following tree recycling drop-off locations are available 24 hours a day through Monday, January II:

- Foothills Community Park, 12795 S. Estrella Parkway, next to the parking lot. PebbleCreek Eagle's Nest parking lot, 3645 N. Clubhouse Drive.
- Palm Valley Park, 13133 W. Monte Vista Drive, on the north side of the park. Goodyear Ballpark, 1933 S. Ballpark Way, in the northwest corner of the parking lot.
 Goodyear Public Works Yard, 200 S. Calle Del Pueblo, 5 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Bulk Trash PickupChristmas trees may be left at the curb for bulk trash pickup. Simply place your Christmas tree at the curb on the date of your next regularly scheduled bulk trash pickup date. Be a good neighbor and wait until the night before pickup to put the tree curbside. Trees left out with weekly container trash will NOT be collected.



Rates are Changing for Water and Sewer

Water and sewer rates are changing. The utility bill for a residential customer who uses 8,000 gallons per month will increase in January by about \$8.30 per month, from an average in 2009 of \$85.51 to \$93.78 next year.

Customers pay for the volume of water used each month, based on a four-tier system. Beginning this month, the cost of the least expensive water rate tier will decrease by 49 cents per 1,000 gallons. High and very high water use will be charged at higher rates to partially offset the higher costs of providing that service. To estimate how the new rates affect your bill, compare your 2009 water bills to the chart shown at the right.

In addition to volume charges, customers pay base fees for water and sewer. These base fees are increasing for all customers. The amount of the cost increase depends on the type of residence, business, size of meter and whether you live inside or outside Goodyear city limits. Check your utility bill for details.

Ways to Save

The City of Goodyear has many ways to help customers control their water bill costs:

- Schedule a free home water audit and irrigation checkup. An expert will visit your home, look for leaks and waste, and suggest ways to trim your monthly water use. Make an appointment at goodyearaz.gov/h2o365.
- Sign up for a free water conservation class at goodyearaz.gov/h2o365.
- Learn how to adjust the timers on your sprinklers or irrigation system.
- Visit the website to learn about plants and landscaping techniques that use little water.

For those South of I-10 Conserving Water Lowers Sewer Bills

For all City of Goodyear water customers (homes south of I-10), the key to keeping your sewer bill low throughout the year is to minimize the amount of water you use in January, February, and March.

The City bases its estimate of the amount of water your household puts down the sewer upon your average monthly water consumption in those three winter months. The City averages your use in January, February, and March to determine your Winter Quarter Average (WQA).

In May, your sewer bill is adjusted to use your new WQA. You will not be charged for more sewer usage than your WQA during the following I2 months. If your water consumption is lower than your WQA, your sewer bill may be based upon the lower usage. If water usage is higher than the WQA, your sewer charge will be based upon the lower WQA. So, water wisely in the winter quarter to save all year.
